Supporting Data	<ol> <li>NEEDS ASSESSMENT: The ACSIP Leadership Team meets periodically for the purpose of reviewing progress, monitoring data and making adjustments in school interventions. This group has oversight in the implementation of our school improvement plan. The group analyzed test results from the following exams: ITBS-Grades 1-2, Benchmark-Grades 3- 6, DRA-Grades K-4, DSA-Grades K-4, DIBELS-Grades K-4, Fry Familiar Word List-Grade 1, TLI Testing-Grades 3-6, Star Reading-All Grades, and Star Math-All Grades. The results have been shared with the entire faculty. It is our aim to aggregate and disaggregate this data for the purpose of determining student learning needs. We have looked at the trends in order to better shape instruction and align it with the curriculum frameworks in literacy and math.</li> </ol>

- St. Joe Elementary is an achieving school in Literacy meeting the 2012 growth model for all students and the Targeted Achievement Gap Group.
   St. Joe Elementary did not meet the 2012 Performance model for all students or the Targeted Achievement Gap Group. Three year performance model was not achieved for all students or the TAG group. Three year growth model was not achieved for all student but was achieved for the TAG group.
- 3. St. Joe Elementary School attendance rate for 2009-10, 10-11, and 11-12 school years are: 93.5, 93.6, and 94.1 respectively.
- 4. 3rd Grade 3-year trend for the April 2011, April 2012, and April 2013 Augmented Benchmark Examination had a Proficient and Advanced Performance of 75%, 79%, and 100%. Weak areas identified in multiple choice areas include Writing and in open response are Practical Passages.
- 5. 4th Grade 3-year trend for the April 2011, April 2012, and April 2013 Augmented Benchmark Examination had a Proficient and Advanced Performance of 73%,76%, and 88%. Weak areas identified in multiple choice areas include Writing and open response included Literary and Practical Passages.
- 6. 5th Grade 3-year trend for the April 2011, April 2012, and April 2013 Augmented Benchmark Examination had a Proficient and Advanced Performance of 65%, 89%, and 76%. Weak areas included for multiple choice include Writing and open response reading Practical Passages. Writing Content Domain and Writing Style Domain were also weak areas.

Priority 2: Improve Elementary Math Skills

- NEEDS ASSESSMENT: The ACSIP Leadership Team meets periodically for the purpose of reviewing progress, monitoring data and making adjustments in school interventions. This group has oversight in the implementation of our school improvement plan. The group analyzed test results from the following exams: ITBS-Grades 1-2, Benchmark-Grades 3-6, DRA-Grades K-4, DSA-Grades K-4, DIBELS-Grades K-4, Fry Familiar Word List-Grade 1, TLI Testing-Grades 3-6, Star Reading-All Grades, and Star Math-All Grades. The results have been shared with the entire faculty. It is our aim to aggregate and disaggregate this data for the purpose of determining student learning needs. We have looked at the trends in order to better shape instruction and align it with the curriculum frameworks in literacy and math.
- 2. St. Joe Elementary is a needs improvement school in Math. St. Joe Elementary did not meet the 2012 Performance model or the Three Year Performance model for all students or the Targeted Achievement Gap Group. Our three sub-populations (White, Economically Disadvantaged, and Students with Disabilities) also did not meet achieving status.
