With your generous support, Friends of the Rivers strives to protect and improve our waters. Some of the ways in which Friends helped last year to protect our waters included:

<u>Advocacy</u> – Friends was active by emailing, writing, calling the EPA, Arkansas Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ), state and national elected officials and speaking at public forums. Friends worked with our members and the public informing them of issues and encouraging them to make their voices heard. "Voices of the Public Matter"

<u>Collaboration</u> – Protecting our waters requires collaboration with many groups, including Trout Unlimited, North Arkansas Fly Fishers, Buffalo River Watershed Alliance, White River Waterkeeper, Arkansas Audubon, Nature Conservancy of Arkansas and the Ozark Society and others. Positive working relationships with

governmental agencies such as ADEQ, Arkansas Natural Resources Commission, the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission, and others with responsibilities that affect the stewardship of our water and other natural resources is a key to Friends success.

Education – Mountain Home High School Storm Drain Art and Dodd Creek Stream Team programs, Dry Run Creek youth fly fishing and introduction to macroinvertebrates teaches youth the connection between healthy water, the ecosystems it supports and their responsibilities as citizens to protect the water and watersheds.
